New Storywalk Book at City View Park



Chef and Mentor Elena Terry Discusses Native American Food Sovereignty

During the Conserve Sauk Film Festival held on the UW-Platteville Baraboo Sauk County campus on November 6, Elena Terry gave a presentation on her efforts to promote the use of traditional ingredients and methods of cooking as a means of helping to build a stronger indigenous communities. Elena is a member of the Ho-Chunk Nation and a trained chef and butcher who specializes in wild game preparation and open-fire, outdoor cooking. She is the Executive Chef and Founder of Wild Bearies, a non-profit catering company that focuses on community outreach, education, responsible gardening practices, and utilizing traditional ingredients in the daily lives of participants. In this role, Elena mentors people in the native community who have suffered trauma from alcohol and drug abuse. Elena is also the Food and Culinary Program Coordinator for the Native American Food Sovereignty Alliance, which strives to reclaim Native peoples' cultural food heritage and build local control over food systems by rebuilding relationships between communities and food growers and providers who use sustainable and ecologically sound agricultural practices.
