

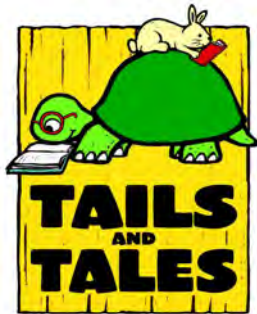


**Whatever your age, there is a Summer Reading Program for you!

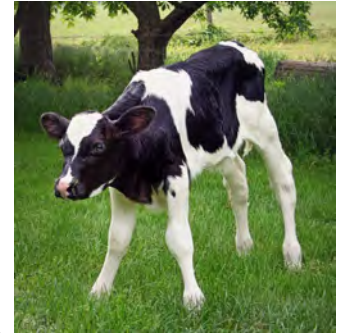
Mooove Over @ Ochsner Park

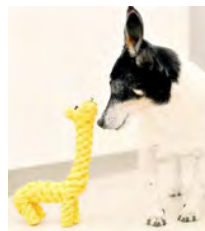


Board Game Day Tuesday, June 15

To celebrate this year's Summer Reading Program theme, Tails and Tales, we will be making toys for the dogs and cats at the Sauk County Humane Society .

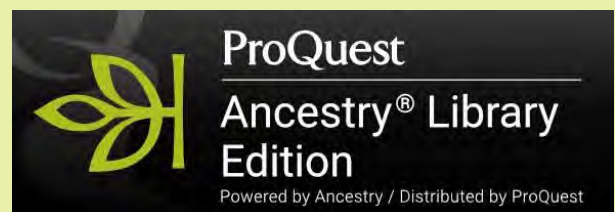
Squirrel Girl! Hawkeye! Ant Man! Oh my! Tuesday, June 29

This book group is for anyone who enjoys reading mysteries. There are two mystery series to choose from for May.

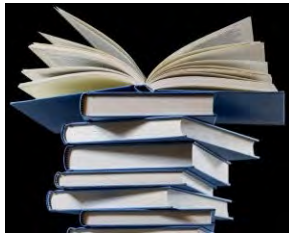

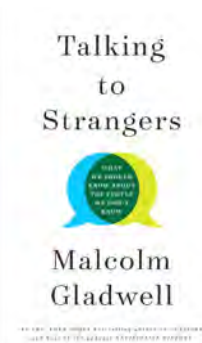
Readers Anonymous

Tuesday, May 25 at 6:30 PM

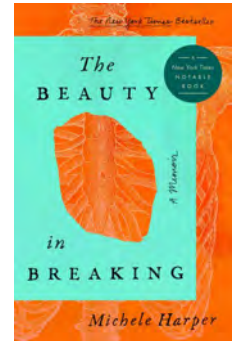
In May, the book club for mature readers will discuss ***The Beauty in Breaking: A Memoir* by Michele Harper.**

Baraboo Seed Library Update

The Baraboo Seed Library is a project co-sponsored by the Baraboo Public Library and the Sauk County Master Gardener Association. It was originally conceived in 2014 as a way to lend heirloom seed to community members to teach and promote the art of heirloom seed saving and sharing. Over the past few years, that mission has changed to encouraging community members to garden, grow some of their own food, save seeds for future growing seasons, and adopt sustainable gardening practices. We also want people to learn about protecting our pollinators.

We no longer ask Seed Library patrons to bring to the library seed they have harvested from the plants grown in their gardens. We rely on seed purchased for the Seed Library, or donated through commercial outlets.

Since the Covid shutdown of the library in 2020, the Seed Library borrowing has been virtual. Instead of patrons browsing through the drawers of the Seed Library, and recording the packets they will take home, we maintain a list on our website of available seeds, and an online form that patrons use to make seed requests. When their seed request is ready, patrons will be notified to come and pick up their seed packets.

Open Hours:

Monday through Thursday - 9 AM to 8 PM

Friday - 9 AM to 6 PM

Saturday - 9 AM to 2 PM

No need for an appointment to come to the library.

You must wear a mask over your mouth and nose to be in the library. If you cannot wear a mask, call us and we can accommodate you outside the library.

Return books to either the drive-up book return in the alley behind the library or the indoor book returns in the Adult and Youth Services Departments.

Pick up library items inside from the hold shelf or call us to arrange for contactless pickup.

Find library items by browsing inside the library, requesting items online through LINKcat, or calling to ask for help in obtaining items.

Use a public computer for up to one hour by making a reservation from our website, stopping in to make a reservation from the LINKcat computer, or by dropping in when the computers are not busy.

Scan documents, fax documents, or make copies by stopping by when it is convenient for you.

Scan photos to digitize them by calling us at 356-6166 and making an appointment with Joan.

Send print jobs to our printer from your own device—from home or in the library—using our web and mobile printing app.
