Community Services Survey Data: Snapshots

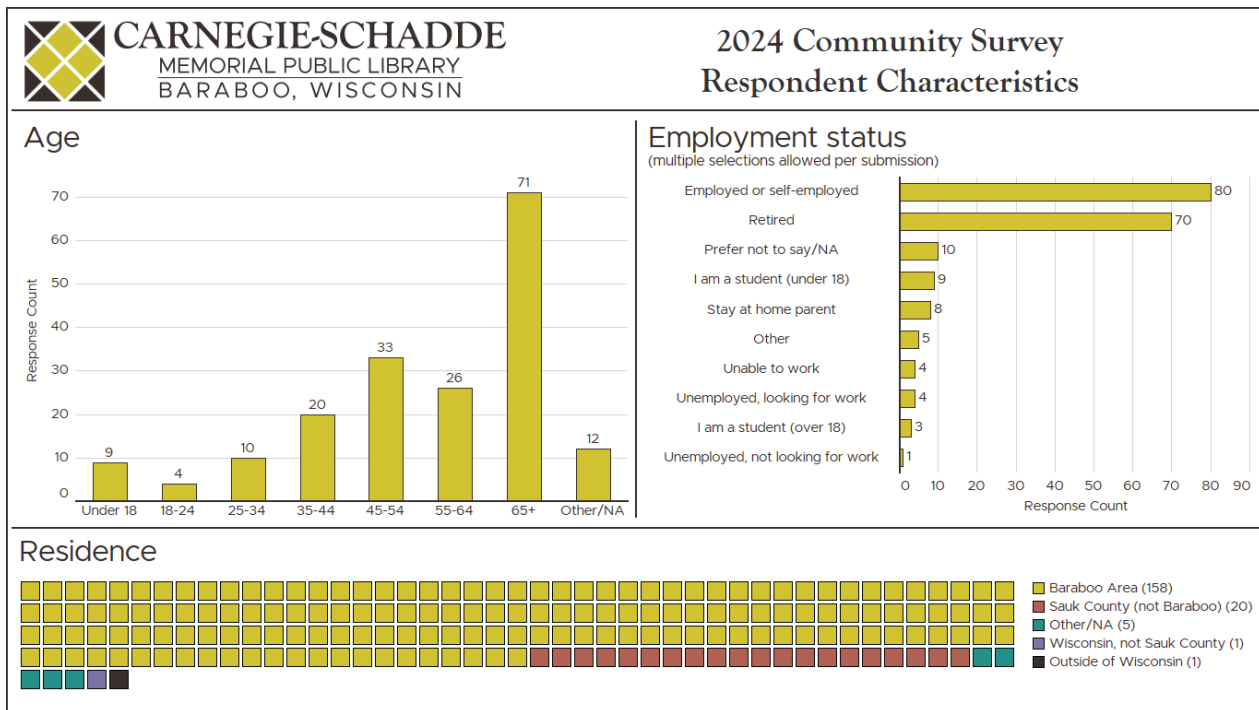
Library board and staff surveys were completed in early fall 2024 and a community library services survey was completed in mid-fall 2024. 185 individuals completed a community survey in the early fall of 2024.

The public services survey indicates that the library is seen as a vital community hub, offering essential services to people of all ages and backgrounds. Key findings include:


1. **Education & Learning:** The library is a center for lifelong learning, providing access to books, educational resources, computer services, and various programs that support literacy and knowledge development for children and adults alike.
2. **Community Building:** It's valued as a space for social interactions, fostering a sense of community, and offering opportunities for people to connect across different demographics. The library serves as a gathering space for all, whether for educational, personal, or social purposes. Community partnerships are highly valued.
3. **Access to Resources:** The library provides valuable resources, such as free internet, computers, printing services, books, audiobooks, movies, and other media. This access is especially crucial for people who may not have these resources at home.
4. **Programming:** The library offers programs for children, teens, and adults, which help stimulate learning, creativity, and social engagement. These programs are seen as important tools for community involvement and personal development.
5. **Inclusivity & Equality:** It's recognized for its role as a "great equalizer," offering free services to everyone regardless of their income or background, and for providing resources that many people might not otherwise have access to.
6. **Nostalgia & Tradition:** For many, the library holds a deep personal and nostalgic value, as it has been an integral part of their lives and families for generations.

Sharing Results

The library director of the Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library will share accountability reports at least twice per year with the library board of trustees at board meetings. Progress reports will be shared with Baraboo Common Council annually, when the Director shares the library's annual report. Staff members will receive updates about the actions of the plan, with special attention to identifying ways their work supports the strategic plan. Community members will learn about collections, materials, services, and programs resulting from the new strategic plan via local media outlets, newspaper articles, social media updates, in-library publicity and community forums and discussions. The library director will refer to goals of the strategic plan when hiring new staff; newly-elected board members will be introduced to the strategic plan and goals as a component of trustee training.

Appendix 1:

Who We Are

The first public library in Baraboo was established in 1895 and was housed in a room at the City Building. Eight years later, in 1903, a new library was built thanks to a \$15,000 grant from Andrew Carnegie at 230 4th Ave. On July 1, 2021, the Baraboo Public Library officially became Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library. The name honors the Schadde family, whose \$2.8 million donation helped make the 2023 library expansion project possible. The Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library remains in its original 4th Ave location, now a 33,000 square foot facility with additions in 1982 and 2023.

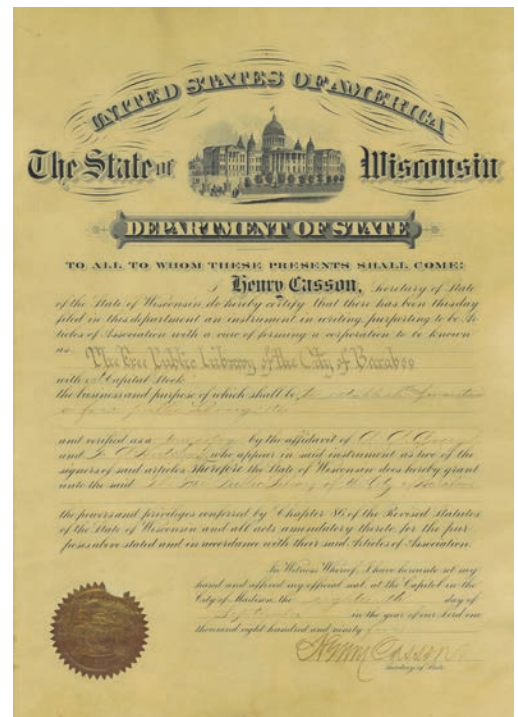
The library is authorized and governed under Wisconsin law, primarily Chapter 43 of the State statutes, and by the City of Baraboo Municipal Code. Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction publishes public library standards that guide the growth and services of libraries. The library is governed by a nine-member library board and is a department of the City of Baraboo. Primary funding for Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library is provided by the City of Baraboo with additional funding from Sauk County.

Supplemental funding comes from the State of Wisconsin aid for the summer library program, library fees, donor funds, and funds raised by the active Friends of the Library group.

As a member of the South Central Library System (SCLS), a state supported system of public libraries in seven counties (Sauk, Green, Dane, Columbia, Adams, Portage and Wood), and the consortium of 54 libraries that offers LINKcat, patrons have access via the on-line catalog to materials in the collections of all LINKcat libraries. In addition patrons have access to materials not owned by LINKcat libraries via out-of-system interlibrary loan and WorldCat. The Library is the Resource Library for all Sauk County public libraries.



The library has 19 employees: 4 full-time, 16 part-time. Full-time positions are: Library Director, Resources Librarian/Assistant Director, Programming & Outreach Librarian, and Public Services Librarian. The library staff provides many services to the community. Friendly, personalized information service is provided in person or by phone. Library staff members are knowledgeable about library resources, technologically competent, and experts in customer service. Ongoing continuing education and professional development is encouraged, and staff participate in an annual staff development day.



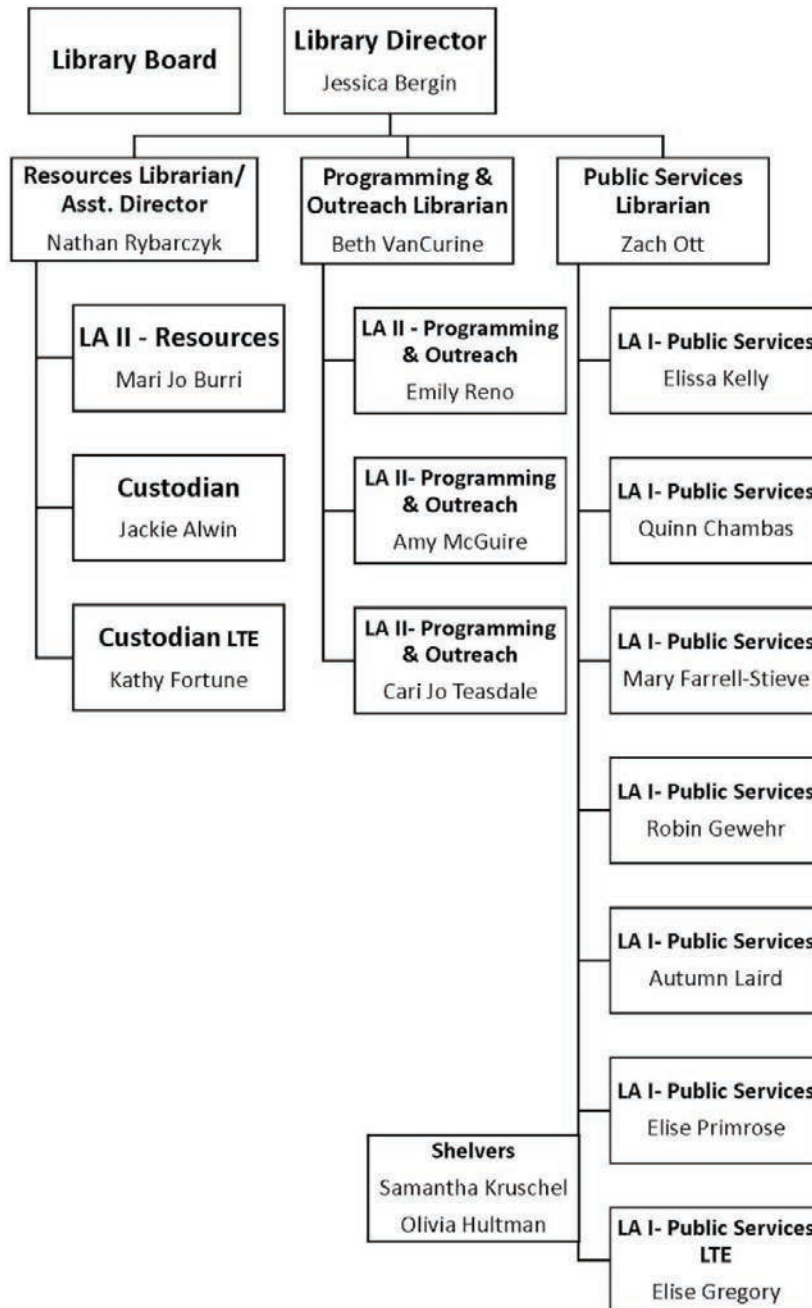
The public services department and adult collections occupy both floors of the older “Carnegie” section of the building and includes historical reading rooms, 4 small meeting rooms (study rooms), a conference meeting room, and business center (computers, printers, copiers). The children’s library is on the second floor of the 2023 addition and includes 2 study rooms, a wellness room, public computers, a Learn and Play space, and a youth program room. The teen area is on the main floor of the 2023 addition and includes 2 study rooms, gaming area, and public computers. Also in the 2023 addition is the Creative Classroom, and Auditorium. The library is accessible to persons with disabilities, equipped with an elevator, large print books, books on CD, DVDs, accessible e-content via Wisconsin’s Digital Library, and offers monthly delivery to the homebound. The Library can also provide patrons with a connection to the Wisconsin Talking Book and Braille library.

The library has a diverse collection of over 84,000 items including books, magazines, newspapers, books on CD, music CDs, and DVDs, as well as online access to over 3,000,000 electronic items representing 800,000 different titles held by the 46 libraries in SCLS’s LINKcat consortium. The library provides and maintains a Local History Collection, including microfilm of much of the Baraboo News Republic from 1855 to the present. In 2022 the newspaper microfilm digitized so it is available online. The library offers the public use of 12 computers, and free wifi access is available throughout the building. The Programming and Outreach Department provides a full range of programs for all ages year round, as well as additional summer programming for all ages.

APPENDIX 2:

Strategic Planning Process

Library Administration and consultant staff from the South Central Library System (SCLS) met in late summer 2024 to identify strategic plan ideas and methods to collect community, library board, and staff input. Library board and staff surveys were completed in early fall 2024 and a community library services survey was completed in mid-fall 2024. Library Director Jessica Bergin and SCLS Consultant staff analyzed surveys, collected demographic data, summarized 2024 library use statistics, and drafted the plan in early 2025. A strategic plan workgroup was created in 2024 to review strategic plan documents and early drafts.

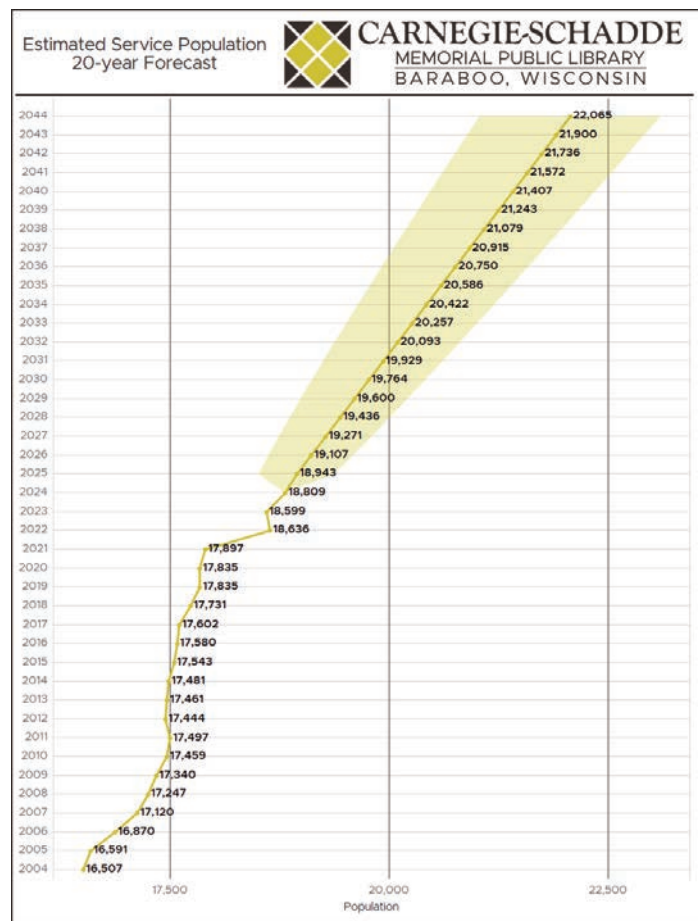
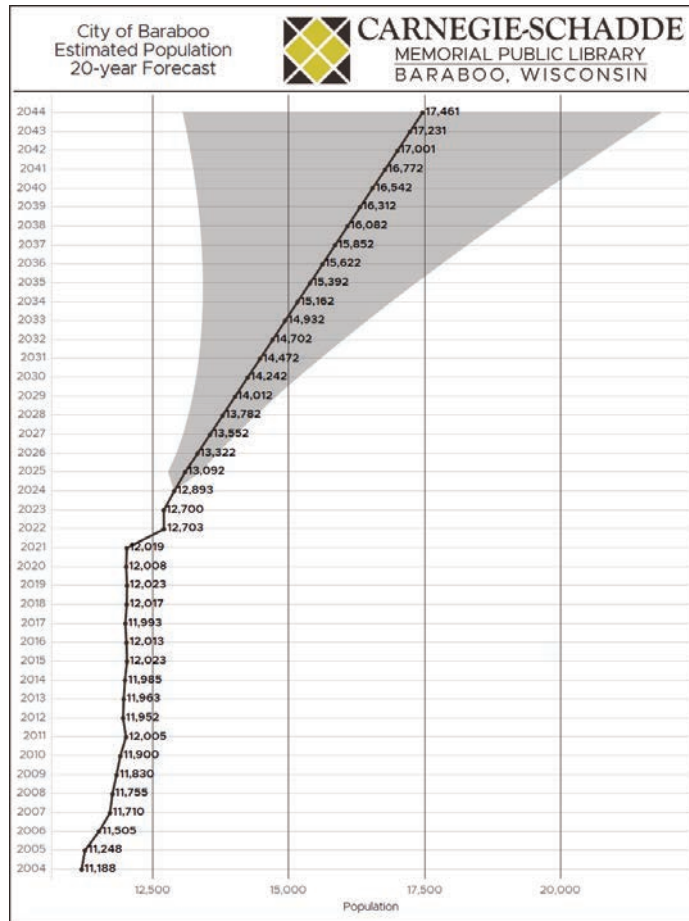

Who We Serve: Population and Demographics

The Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library serves residents in the **City of Baraboo, Town of Baraboo, Village of West Baraboo, and Town of Delton**. Currently, the population of Baraboo is 13,092 with anticipated growth reaching 17,461 by the year 2044; the library's current service area population is 18,809 with anticipated growth reaching 22,065 by 2044 (WI Dept. of Administration). 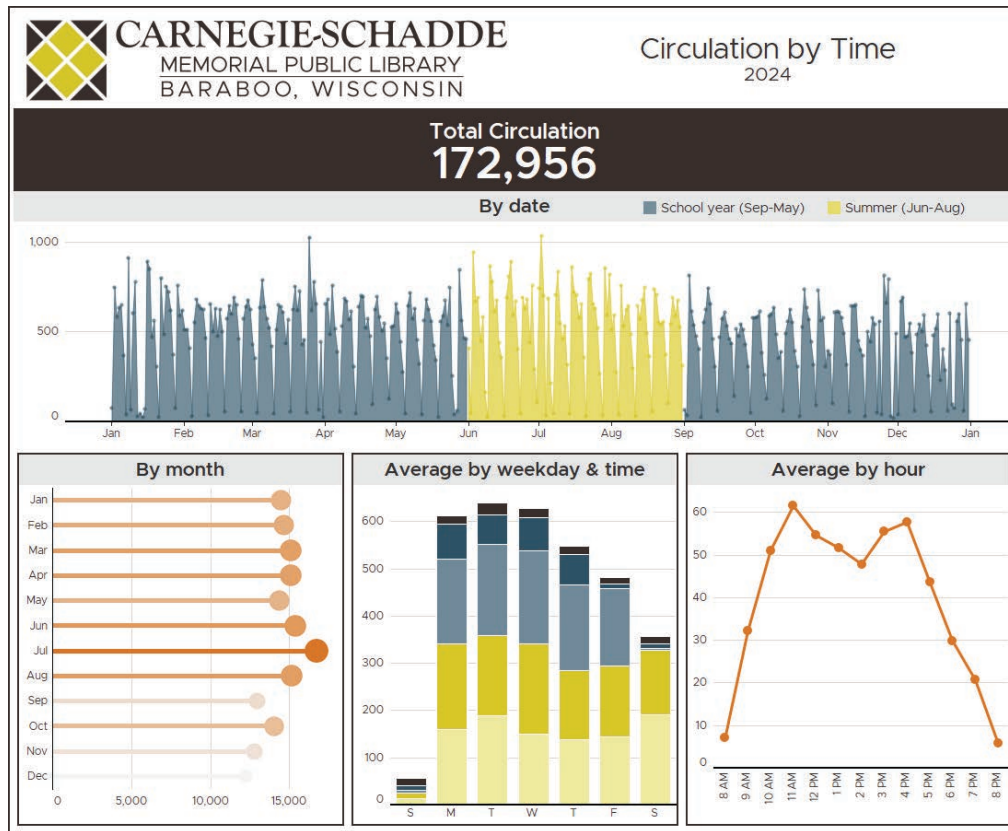

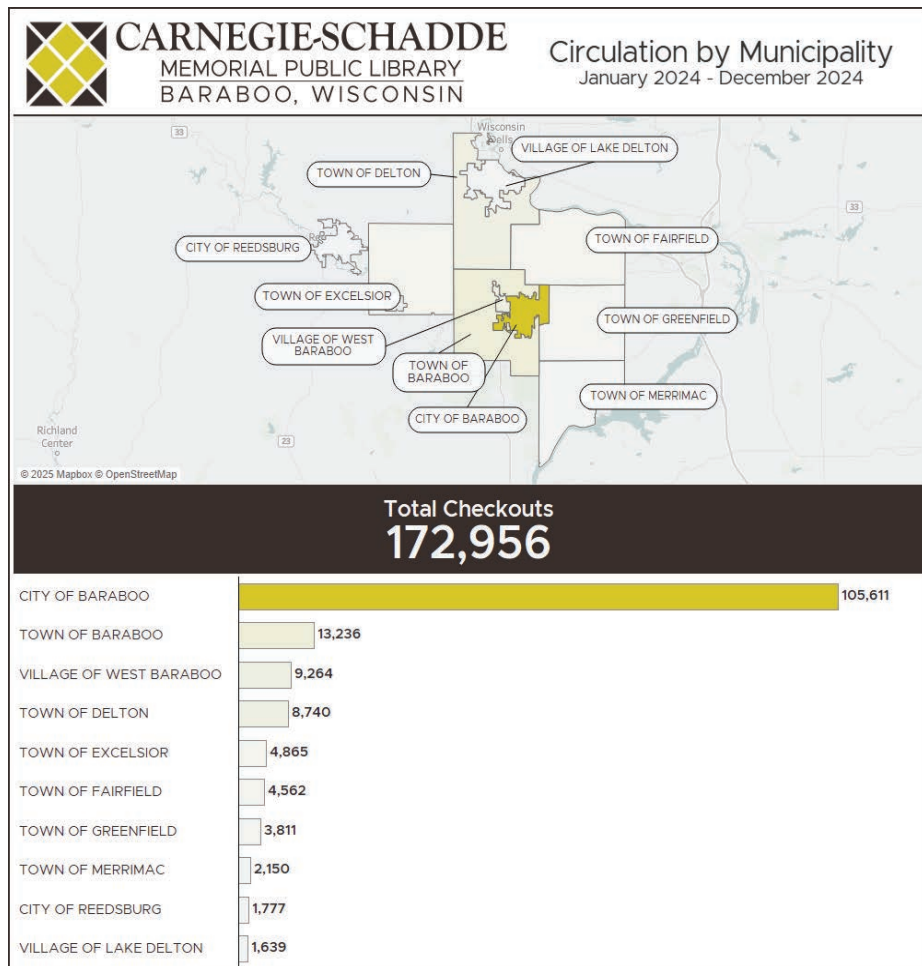

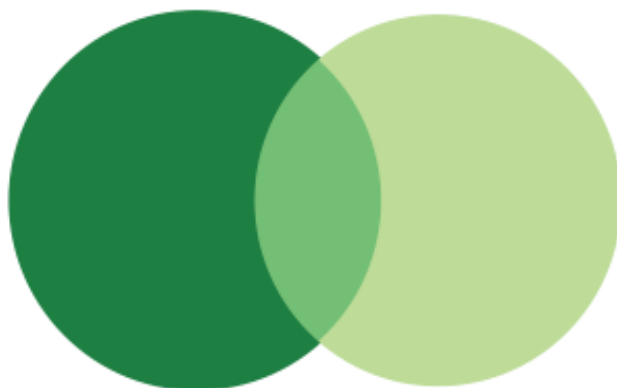

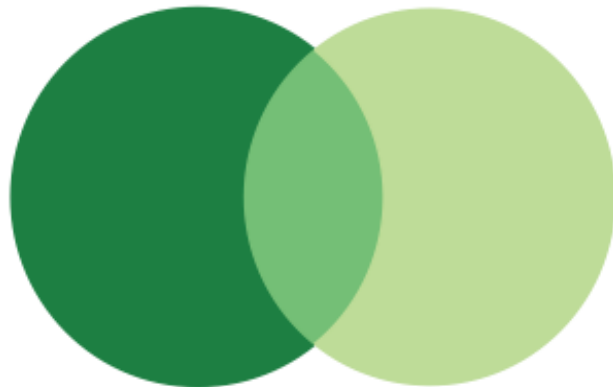

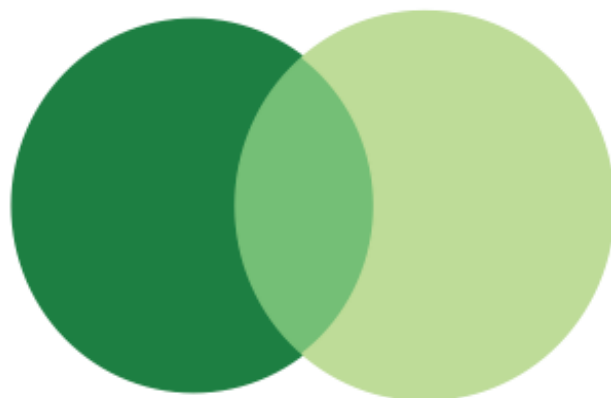
