Library Summer Reading Programs



July was a busy month for our summer reading programs, with fun and educational activities happening most days of the week.

Tuesdays brought us Eco

Explorers, a weekly program meant to pique children's interest in the world around them by looking at and exploring things in nature. Ms. Cari Jo would pair a book with hands on experiments: they explored clouds by creating a cloud in a jar and then learned two techniques for painting clouds in their nature journals. They learned about bubbles by making a human sized bubble model, experimenting with changing the shape of bubbles by creating various shaped wands and bubble snakes, and tried their luck making huge bubbles. Eco Explorers is for children 4K-5th grade.

On Wednesday mornings, the library had Stories in the Park, which brought together children and their caregivers, encouraging bonding through early literacy experiences. Each week featured a few early literacy tips, songs, stories, and rhymes, as well as movement activities and outdoor activities that correspond to areas of child development. Stories in the Park is for children from birth to age 5 and their families.

On Thursdays, we had weekly family programs at different locations in the Baraboo area. On July 21, we had the White Mound County Park Discovery Day. Staff from White Mound put together a pollinator scavenger hunt, UW Extension put out their StoryWalk® of Jingle Dancer by Cynthia Leitich Smith on a walking trail that goes by the lake, and two members of the Ho-Chunk Nation shared information about the cultural significance of the jingle dance and explained the meaning of their stunning regalia. Then, participants created owls out of recycled cardboard and sticks. The StoryWalk® Project was created by Anne Ferguson of Montpelier, VT and developed in collaboration with the Kellogg-Hubbard Library. Storywalk® is a registered service mark owned by Ms. Ferguson.
