2013 HIGHLIGHTS

A visit to our library helped *Smithsonian Magazine* reporter Susan Spano select Baraboo as the "4th Best Small Town to Visit in America." The beginning of the year also saw library use increase by nearly all measures. Compared to 2012, checkouts rose by 7%, library visits increased by 8%, and program attendance rose by 15%.

Our patrons continued to increase their use of Wisconsin's Digital Library, our state-wide library resource for e-content. After a nearly 500% increase in e-checkouts in 2012 compared to 2011, we still saw a 46% increase in 2013.

We have significantly expanded our patrons' range of resources by pioneering a cooperative partnership with the UW–Baraboo/Sauk County Library. We now offer Wisconsin's first library card that gives patrons borrowing privileges at both Baraboo's public and academic libraries.


PROGRAMMING AND PUBLIC RELATIONS

Fresh ideas and new collaborations have been brought to programming.

The Youth Services Department launched a year of monthly Saturday family programs. Working closely with the Baraboo School District, Youth Services visited 4-K sites monthly for story times throughout the academic year and made regular visits to all Baraboo schools, both public and private. Story time families went on the road to Oak Park Place, to provide intergenerational programming for their residents.

Adult Services programming was diverse, from weekly fly-tying classes, to programs on origami, cheese, and Irish literature. Michael Czarnecki taught us about poetry and memoir writing, and *New York Times* best-selling author Jennifer Chiaverini did a book signing and reading.

Another program series was based on the Bridging Cultures Bookshelf/ Muslim Journeys grant in partnership with the UW–Baraboo/Sauk County Library and Wisconsin Dells' Kilbourn Public Library.



Many of these outstanding programs were made possible by the generous support of local sponsors, including the Baraboo National Bank, BMO Harris Bank, Community First Bank, the Baraboo Elks Lodge, Oak Park Place, and Quintessential Quilts of Reedsburg, as well as grants from Sauk County, Wal-Mart, and the American Library Association.

Development Director Robin Whyte organized our entry in the new Baraboo Area Chamber of Commerce Big Top Parade. A crew of staff, library Friends, and volunteers donned sandwich board illustrations from *Last Night I Dreamed a Circus*, and marched in the parade to the delight of all. The Friends of the Library sponsored this project.

As a part of our communications and public relations initiative, Whyte also launched a monthly library newsletter, *Ex Libris*, wrote a monthly library column for the *Baraboo News Republic*, and did weekly press releases highlighting library news and events.



Dig Into Reading was the theme for the summer reading program. Among the highlights was a visit by a live boa constrictor and other creatures of the rainforest with Nature's Niche.

STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS

The Library Board continued to prioritize financial stewardship of the investment of the trust finds they hold. After an assessment of the dismal certificate of deposit interest rates available, the Undesignated Trust Funds Investment Policy was revised and \$200,000 was added to the existing Pershing, LLC account, the value of which was \$858,640 at the end of 2013.

Our East Building tenant, Dane County Title Company's Land Title Service, asked to rent the entire building for their growing service and storage needs. In 2013 net revenue earned from rent (after expenses) was nearly \$60,000.

In addition to seeking sponsorships and support throughout the year, in December Development Director Robin Whyte conducted the library's first year-end appeal, which raised more than \$6,000 in donations. Additionally, the Library Building Fund received \$11,250 in donations, plus the Alma Waite Fund matching grant of \$11,131.

Acknowledging the dramatic changes in technology and library services since our expansion and remodel plan was created, it became clear that revisiting and updating the 2009 conceptual design was necessary. The Library Board charged the Buildings & Grounds Committee to collect and summarize input from staff and Board members to update the building program. As a result, Building & Grounds Chair Lena Nissley, Development Director Robin Whyte, and Library Director Meg Allen met with OPN, our architects, to discuss change options. OPN submitted a proposal to update the design (approved by the Library Board in early 2014).

COLLECTION

To feed the growing demand for electronic content system-wide, SCLS libraries joined forces to launch an Overdrive Advantage account. This collection provides additional copies of items in highest demand for the exclusive use of SCLS patrons.

Youth Services Librarian Carey Kipp completed a weeding of the picture books to begin a reorganization of this collection by subject and theme for easier use.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Two major capital building maintenance projects were undertaken in 2013. Energy-saving white protective membranes replaced deteriorating membranes on the flat part of our roof. A crumbling brick chimney was removed, and a new stainless steel vent was installed as a replacement.

A workgroup was formed to study the space needs in the Adult Department, and a phased improvement plan was recommended. The plan includes purchasing new clear boxes for the periodical collection, adding a new interior return box, moving the reading room to the library's front west room, new open hold shelves, and a reorganization of collections.

Our historic building is aging. Some repairs have been made and others postponed. Continued maintenance is a challenge to our operations budget, underscoring the need for building renovation and expansion.



We spruced up the Adult Department reading room with new display boxes for the magazines and newspapers. The library subscribes to 200 different titles!

Seeking inspiration for our reading rooms, Library Board members Lena Nissley and Nicol Knappen, Development Director Robin Whyte, and Director Meg Allen made a field trip to Madison to take in historic details at the State Capitol and at the Wisconsin Historical Society's recently restored reading room.







TECHNOLOGY

Reliable, building-wide wireless access was achieved through the installation of a second access point on the lower level. The equipment was part of a Library Services and Technology Act grant awarded to SCLS.

We took a serious look at our overall technology needs. A workgroup from the Baraboo Public Library, the UW–Baraboo/Sauk County Library, and the Baraboo School District IT department was convened to evaluate SCLS tech support, as well as explore cloud-based solutions for staff and patron future needs.



LIBRARY BOARD AND PERSONNEL

Board member Nancy Nelson stepped down after serving for many years. As a former reference librarian, Nancy's unique perspective will be missed. Lori Von Asten was appointed to succeed her. Common Council member John Ellington was appointed to replace Karla Vale, who chose not to run for reelection. Chris Olson, the new principal at the West Kindergarten Center, was selected as the new school district representative, replacing Jim Ruder whose new employment took him away from Baraboo.

There were just two changes in library staff in 2013. Susan Thiede and Maria Ingraham both resigned their parttime Circulation Assistant positions, which were filled by Barbara Lund and Greg DeSanto.

POLICIES

In addition to the revision of the Undesignated Trust Fund Investment Policy by the Finance Committee, the Policy Committee completed revisions to the Internet Acceptable Use Policy and the Gift Policy. At the Committee's recommendation, the Board adopted a new Laptop Checkout Policy, which will allow lending laptop computers for use in the Library, a new service planned for 2014.
